Clearing Champions League Confusion

Türkiye's Tradition

Sugar waxing, a traditional Turkish beauty practice, involves using a mixture of sugar, lemon juice, and water to create a sticky paste. This natural wax is applied to the skin, gripping the hair, and is then pulled off to remove it,

leaving the skin smooth. It's gentle on the skin.

- "A Small Guide"
 - 1 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 small saucepan
- A butter knife or popsicle stick
- Cotton or linen fabric, cut into 7cm x 15cm strips
 - A heatproof container

Instructions: Combine the sugar, water, and lemon juice in a saucepan. Heat over medium and bring to a boil, then reduce to medium-low and cook for 5-8 minutes, stirring constantly. The mixture should be slightly frothy but not fully boiling. Adjust the heat as needed. To check readiness, scoop a spoonful—if you can't see any sugar granules, it's done. Let it cool in the pot until it thickens to a honey-like consistency, then transfer it to a heatproof container and refrigerate for 15-20 minutes until lukewarm.

To wax, spread a thin layer of the mixture onto your leg using the popsicle stick. Place a fabric strip on top, pressing it down firmly, and pull the strip off in the opposite direction of hair growth. - When it is fully cooked, place it on a plate and enjoy.


Scrambled Egg:


of his friends from last year were also there. Mika said that the environment of the program was very nice. He
